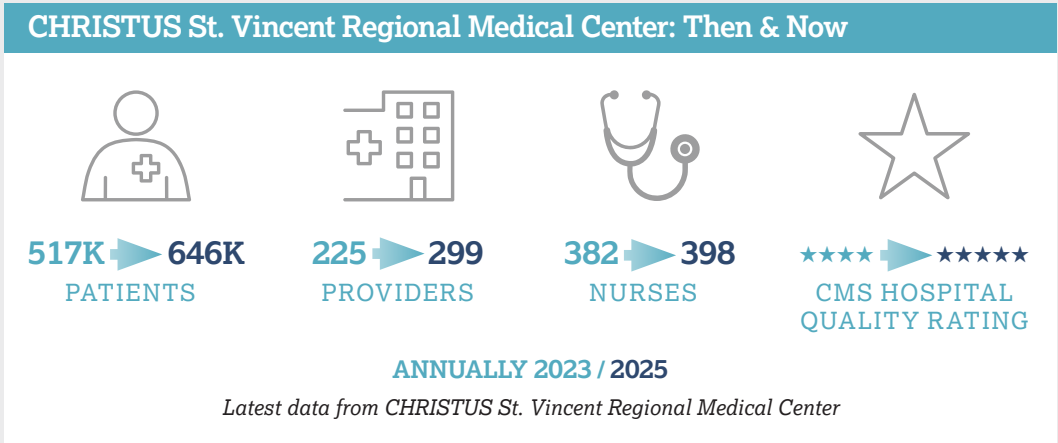

Moving Forward

Since 2023, when Anchorum became independent from CHRISTUS St. Vincent Regional Medical Center, the hospital has continued to thrive as a high-quality healthcare provider with skilled staff, physicians, and leadership. The hospital recently earned a five-star quality rating, reflecting its continued commitment to delivering outstanding care to all patients, including indigent members of our community.



Clinical Support Fund: A Continuing Partnership to Strengthen Care in Our Region

Anchorum is committing \$109 million over the next decade to improve health care access and outcomes across northern New Mexico. The Clinical Support Fund is focused on five key areas: cancer care, maternal health, primary care, trauma readiness, and workforce development.

This investment comes at a critical time. As rural clinics close and federally qualified health centers face mounting financial strain, CHRISTUS St. Vincent is expanding essential services that are disappearing elsewhere. We are proud to continue to partner with CHRISTUS Health to keep high-quality, integrated care accessible across the region.



In July 2025, the new 80,000-square-foot Regional Cancer Center at CHRISTUS St. Vincent opened its doors. Designed with comfort and dignity in mind, it is the only comprehensive cancer care center in northern New Mexico. \$10 million from Anchorum’s Clinical Support Fund went toward this critical project.

Community Health Funds Guided by Community, Informed by Fellows

Anchorum has made a five-year, \$25 million commitment to create Community Health Funds at five community foundations. These donor-advised funds provide flexible, long-term resources to support health and well-being in each region.

The Anchorum Fellows play a key role in guiding these funds. By identifying key priorities and partners, Fellows ensure that grantmaking from these funds reflects each community's desires and makes the greatest impact.







Learning &

As a learning organization, we spend time listening to communities and understanding the issues that matter most to them. Over the past year, **affordable housing has been one of the areas where we have learned the most.** Across our entire region, in communities big and small, the lack of housing has emerged as a pressing priority.

Through educational sessions, site visits, and conversations with partners and stakeholders, we've deepened our understanding of the challenges and opportunities in housing.

Innovation

Our housing learning reinforced what many Native communities already know: Tribal members are limited in how they can develop or use land without federal approval. Tribal land is held in trust by the federal government, meaning that Natives use and live on the land, but they don't hold full ownership like private property. Because of this, Native Americans face challenges trying to buy or own homes on trust land.

Traditional financing systems and banks are often unwilling to secure mortgages because they cannot use the land as collateral. In addition, building or renovating homes often requires federal approval, leading to delays and added costs. To address this gap, we invested in Native Community Capital, a Native-led Community Development Financial Institution which works with underserved people and communities. Their work is creating new pathways for housing and infrastructure development on Native land. Our work with Tribes always begins by acknowledging their sovereignty. By supporting Native-led solutions, we can help advance strategies that are specifically designed to work on Tribal land and that create models for lasting change.



From Learning to Innovation: Homegrown Housing

What we learned over the past year directly shaped a new initiative: the **Homegrown Housing** program, launched in August 2025.

This program supports local leaders and organizations with hands-on training, peer learning, and potential funding to explore and shape affordable housing projects in their communities.

Led in partnership with Project Moxie, Homegrown Housing is designed to get promising projects off the ground and to grow capacity where it already exists, on the ground, close to home.

Transformational Investments

Capital for Change

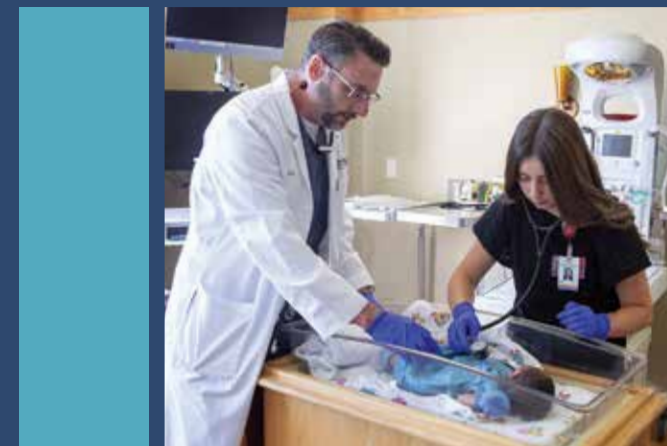
We've made a \$10 million impact investment in Homewise to help finance infrastructure for the third phase of Tierra Contenta, a long-planned mixed use community in southwest Santa Fe. This phase will add 1,500 new housing units, designed to be as affordable as possible, advancing our shared mission to create healthy, thriving communities. Our investment is part of a \$35 million boost for Homewise, including a \$25 million donation from MacKenzie Scott's Yield Giving.

Investing in Care, Building the Future

San Juan County, a federally designated Health Professional Shortage and Medically Underserved Area, where nearly four in ten residents are Native, is addressing critical service gaps through a new **Internal Medicine Residency Program at San Juan Regional Medical Center**. With our partnership, the program will recruit, train, and retain physicians, creating a pipeline of providers rooted in the community and transforming health outcomes in the area.

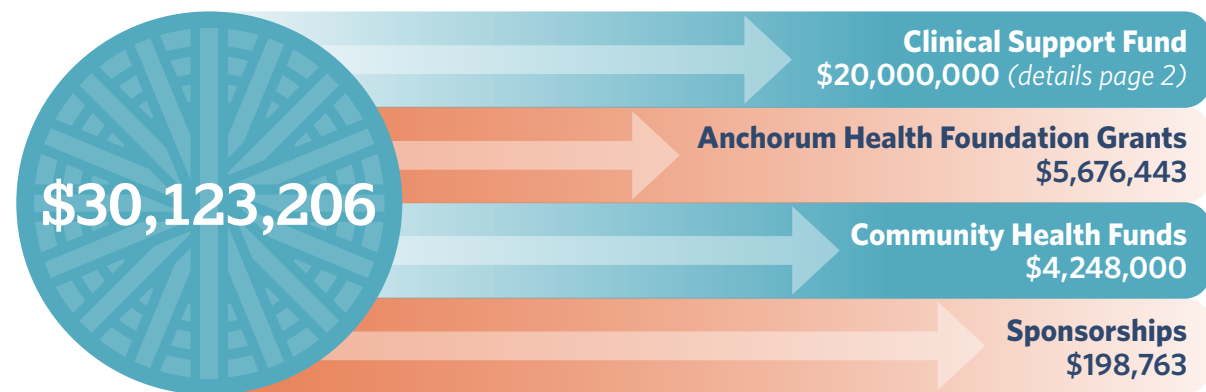
With our support, the **University of New Mexico's Health Extension Rural Offices (HEROs) program** is expanding to include six new Partner HEROs, three serving Tribal communities, along with two Regional Tribal HEROs based in Pueblo and Navajo Nation lands. By connecting local priorities with UNM resources and piloting partnerships like one with Sunrise Clinics, HEROs are addressing the full range of social determinants of health.

Anchorum has partnered with **La Familia Medical Center**, a trusted safety-net provider, to strengthen its financial operations and preserve access to high-quality care. Through ongoing technical assistance, La Familia is improving billing and collections, accepting new patients, and retaining more providers. Strengthening these clinics' financial sustainability is even more critical as looming cuts to federal funding threaten the future of safety-net care. This work reflects our continued commitment to federally qualified health centers and other clinics that deliver essential services to more than 300,000 New Mexicans under increasingly challenging conditions.

HEALTH CARE ACCESS & SYSTEMS — \$1,331,500

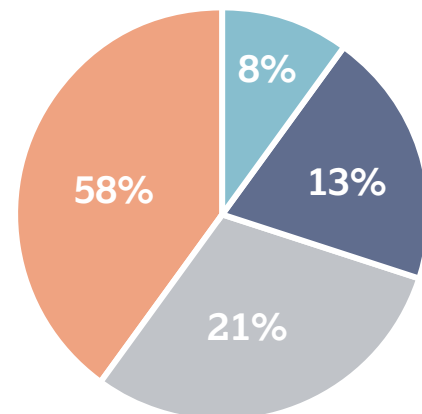
Includes expanding rural residency programs and supporting health councils and community health workers.

Builds healthy, resilient communities, such as increasing access to affordable housing, emergency shelters, and other essential human services.

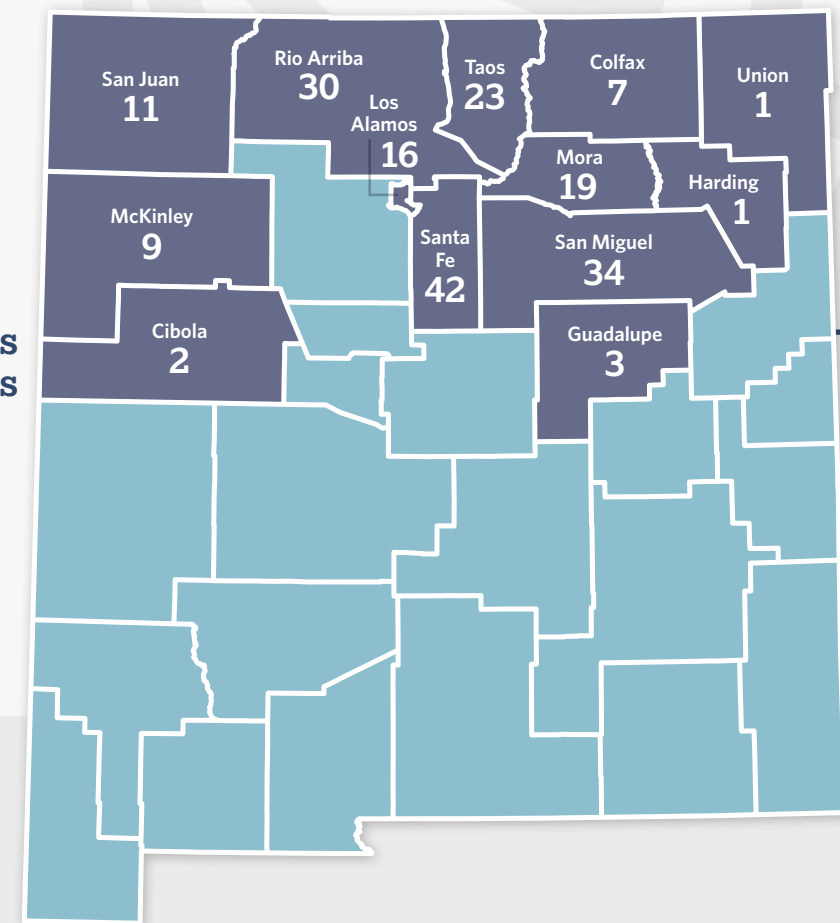


TOTAL GRANTS
